Being a Military Chaplain – Spiritual Special Ops

Dianne and I just returned from Hurlburt Field Air Force Base where we spent half of a Sunday with RBNet associated chaplains Lt. Colonel Josh Stoley, Captain Jonathan Black, and Captain Steven Richardson. After touring the impressive chapel facilities, we were exhilarated by the worship service which was opened by Josh reading all of Psalm 104 to a congregation of nearly 100, down from 150 on Easter. I preached for their typical 40 minutes with a smattering of multi-echnic "amens" punctuating things. It felt very Reformed Baptist. You don't expect this from an Uncle Sam financed service in Caesar's household!

These chaplains are elite men. They're influential. Josh had invited 4 additional chaplains he wanted to introduce to RBNet over lunch. The discussion was theologically robust and spiritually warm.

They're taking on Special Ops caliber missions like last week's contribution to the Israel shielding endeavor vs. Iran, and the earlier crash of two Osprey planes into the Pacific requiring intense grief counseling. They meet up with men and women at their Wit's End (Psalm 107), and seek to speak a word in season.

They do marriage counseling in a high divorce culture, emotional encouraging in a suicide ideation laden clientele, truth-telling amidst homosexuals and lesbians and transgenders, and evangelism to souls from every tribe, tongue, kindred, and nation.

Sure, they need to patiently endure the folly of chaotic administrations and commanders in chief, but so did Daniel in Babylon putting up with the likes of Nebuchadnezzar and Belshazzar.

If you've been told you're peculiarly gifted for ministry, consider the chaplaincy. Watch for the latest NetTalk episode where I interview this trio of impressive RBNet mighty men. Pray for them and ponder. ®

Mission Thoughts

THE OPPRESSED

In His home town Jesus opened the book and found a place where it was written: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." (Luke 4:18, 19 ESV).

Jesus came for the downtrodden of society. One group to which Jesus ministered was the "oppressed." The word that Jesus chose is pregnant with meaning as defined by these lexicons: Mounce says the meaning is "to break, crushed by cruel oppression"; Louw and Nida, "to choke, to cause serious trouble to, with the implication of dire consequences—'to cause severe hardship, to oppress, to overwhelm."

What can we learn from the Gospels about the oppressed that Jesus came for?

THE POLITICAL OPPRESSED

The Jews were under Roman domination. Jesus came to show his brothers in the flesh that they could be set free from this captivity by the gospel he preached. Too many countries have political oppression and missionaries minister to these dear people.

THE RELIGIOUS OPPRESSED

Luke records (11:17 ff.) that Jesus accepted the invitation from a Pharisee to dine with him. Jesus sat down but did not first wash before dinner. Jesus then proceeded to declare that outward religion, such as the Pharisees required, is evil. And then Jesus pronounced woe on both the Pharisees and the lawyers. Is it any wonder that the common people crowded around Him to listen to the gospel? Today many are oppressed by legalism. Missionaries minister to them.

THE PHYSICALLY OPPRESSED

Jesus showed compassion to those who were sick and demon possessed. This is beautifully highlighted in Luke 8:1-3. Former demon possessed and sick women so loved our Lord that they financially supported Him. Missionaries minister to oppressed women.

Let's pray for our missionaries who see oppression and bring the gospel to the oppressed. ®
